
Let there be Light K.Mulhern



From Celebrating Pentecost

Spirit as water, wind, and fire by Steve Taylor

Outside my window is a wooden fence. On wet winter mornings I wake to the steady drip of my overflowing gutter. One day, unable to sleep, I got up and went seeking the source of this noisy drip. I discovered that the gutter dripped onto my wooden fence. Climbing up, I saw a two centimetre hollow in the wood.

This is the power of water. A drop at a time, the hardness of our lives is eroded by the love of the Spirit of God. The Bible has a number of images of Spirit as water. Nicodemus must be "born through water and the Holy Spirit" while in Isaiah and Joel, the Spirit is to be poured out on all. Like water, the Spirit is to immerse us in the grace of God.

Spirit as wind is also an important image in New Zealand spirituality. We are an island nation, and thus uniquely open to be shaped by the wind. Whether it's the Canterbury nor'wester howling through the trees, or the Northland cyclone driving campers home, the Spirit as wind can be an important Kiwi image. The wind is unpredictable. In John 3: 7-8, the wind blows where it will. So will everyone born of the Spirit.

Fire is most commonly linked to the birth of the church at Pentecost. "They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them." The neat thing is the way fire is for all. The barriers are down. Women and children are empowered. New Zealand Maori used to burn off bush, allowing new growth to emerge. The resulting unfurling fern fronds are a reminder of the close link between fire and new life.



Home Sweet Home

A report from Family Works, Presbyterian Support

Daniel and his 12 year old daughter Fleur were homeless. It was the middle of winter (2016) and the father and daughter had nowhere to go.

Daniel tried to get government housing assistance, but because he only had one child and one was earning \$2 over the weekly income threshold, he didn't qualify for help. Yet Daniel's income wasn't enough to cover rent in a city where housing prices were at an all time high.

The father and daughter had no other option than to live in a tent in a campground. But the dire living conditions started making Fleur sick, and Daniel knew something had to change. Desperate, he turned to Family Works for help.

Family Works paid for the family to stay in a cabin for a few nights, while a Family Works social worker worked out what support they were entitled to hand helped Daniel access it. Within days, the father and daughter had a house, and thanks to the support of Family Works' supporters and the local Marae, the basic beds, furniture and household items they needed to get back on their feet.

Family Works social worker Shelly Evans says this is one of the many case of homelessness and poverty Family Works sees on a daily basis.

"Poverty is definitely increasing."

"The cost of living is simply out of reach for many people. There is a high demand for housing and not enough of it. We walk alongside families to help them to have a voice, to know their rights, and we help to connect them with the right support so they're able to overcome whatever challenges they're facing." Waiwhetu United's Study and Discussion Group FORGIVENESS

Joseph F Sica, Catholic Priest said as Christians, if we take Jesus seriously, we are challenged to embrace forgiveness, one of the most difficult of Christian Virtues and Archbishop Desmond Tutu said "There is no future without forgiveness" During Lent some members of Waiwhetu studied Marjorie J Thompson's Lenten Study on "Forgiveness" The book has six chapters which cover beginnings, prelude to forgiveness, engaging the inner struggle, getting a new mind, embracing forgiveness, beginning again (reconciliation and restoration). We discussed our own deep need of forgiveness, receiving it and giving it, and how we get past the emotional barriers to real forgiveness. Whether it is a matter between individuals or more meaningful in the context of communities, and how far does Jesus mean us to pursue it.

Everybody who attended the study group felt the study was really worthwhile and can confirm this book is the perfect resource for examining both our ability to forgive and our own need for forgiveness. While we did study it as a group, we believe it is an excellent resource for personal devotions and we have two copies of the book available through the Waiwhetu Resource Centre.
