As I turned around there was a stale smell and standing behind me were 2 poor homeless men. As I looked down at the short man close to me, he was 'smiling'. He said 'Good day' as he counted the few coins he was clutching. I held my tears as I stood there with them. The lady at the counter asked what they wanted. He said 'Coffee is all Miss'. It was all they could afford. They needed to sit in the cafe to warm up, so they had to buy something. They just wanted to be warm.

Then I really felt it, the compulsion was so great I almost reached out and embraced the little man with the blue eyes. That is when I noticed all eyes in the cafe were on me, judging my every action. I smiled and asked the assistant to give me two more breakfast meals on a separate tray. I put the tray down and laid my hand on the blue-eyed gentleman's cold hand. He looked up at me with tears in his eyes and said, 'Thank you.' I leaned over, patted his hand and said, 'I didn't do this, God is here working through me to give you hope.'

I started to cry as I walked away to join my husband and son. When I sat down my husband smiled and said, 'That is why God gave you to me, Honey, to give me hope.'

I returned to college on the last evening of class with this story in hand. I turned in my project and the instructor read it. She looked up at me and said, 'Can I share this?' I nodded as she got the attention of the class. She began to read and that is when I knew that we as human beings and part of God, share a need to heal people and be healed.







In my experience, young people want a safe place to be transparent and they want you to love them even when they do things — and believe things — of which you wouldn't approve. If you want an opportunity to speak into their life, they have to know you genuinely care for them. If you talk about the concept of mentoring — they are into it. If a more experienced person is willing to invest in them — they'll listen. This is a huge opportunity for the church in reaching a newer generation. *Ron Edmonson*.
