The item of news hit the headlines. Already it has dropped onto the scrap heap of stale news. But not for me—much to my surprise!

The story is stunning for its features of persistence and precision. I'm referring to the space probe called "New Horizons" put up by NASA. It only weighs 1,000 lbs (a grand-piano size). It has been on a 9 year voyage to the planet Pluto, flying at the blistering speed of 31,000 mph to cover the 3.7 billion miles. The accuracy meant that after its 9 year journey it arrived at the end only 78 seconds late. Wow!

Here's another note to add: Communications from NASA to "New Horizons" take 4-1/2 hours, or 9 hours for the round trip of a message out to the probe and back

All of this has been like a door opening onto a new view of space for me. It is raising all sorts of questions. It has set me pondering on what people mean by saying such things as: "I need my own space", or "this space has a nice feel to it", or "I find that person is a bit too spacy for me". What do these or other common expressions mean for you?

Have you noticed the way in which space and silence are so often linked together? People often feel drawn to making a solitary trek in a wilderness area. They feel the challenge of space and silence in their attempt to discover more about themselves. At times it can be no more than an hour's walk on the beach or in the bush. We see all the great saints and sages heading for solitary spaces as an essential part of their inner spiritual growth.

LOOKING INTO SPACE

Thank God for the sky—if you like, call it the sky-space. It is so vast, generous, friendly and constant. When the clouds emerge out of the space and race through it the sky-space never complains. It is completely untroubled by screaming jet planes, squawking birds and space debris treating it like a great city rubbish dump. When people build a hut or create a Taj Mahal and wall in bits of space and do their best to make it a nice, comfortable, welcoming space of their own, the space never complains or gets angry with such action. We can grab space to make it ours but space knows that whatever we snatch for ourselves is still just space. The inside space is still just out-side space. It is always one space.

The more we ponder the ins and outs of space it seems that the philosophers, scientists, mystics and meditators keep pointing us to some key things.

- The space we experience is vast. We encounter little bits like the inside of houses in different rooms, or the space in cup or clay pot, but it is not a separate or different space from the vast sky-space.
- Space is not nothingness. It is truer to say that space is everythingness—that all objects, all forms, all thoughts, all ideas emerge from space. It is often said these days that 'space alone is'. The great scientist David Bohm put it this way: "Space as a whole is the ground of existence and we are in it. So space doesn't separate us, it unites us."
- Space is not only vast it is infinite, eternal and beautiful. The mind boggles, bends and breaks in trying to understand space—which is a good sign that the mind itself has emerged from a source so infinite, creative and constant. As the human species we are fond of saying: "Space—the final frontier". In one sense space has no frontier, no boundary, no edge to fall off, no end to discover. Yet it is a frontier for us—our tiny understanding is unable to cross into this infinite wonder.

LOOKING FOR SPACE— AND FINDING IT

There are several incidents which mention casually that Jesus went off to what was described as a lonely place on the edge of the village where he was staying. Why?

- To find a place (the space) between the series of hectic physical demands from people, events and noise?
- To find the space between his thoughts in order to be immersed in the creative source of his life?
- To confirm and nourish his inner knowledge of who he is and why he is where he is?
- To restore the balance between activity and refreshment, between giving and receiving, between doing and being?
- To strengthen the bond of his being one with the Father. To know (beyond his mind knowing) "that I live, yet not I, but the Christ consciousness which flows within me"?
